140G RICH TEA OR SIMILAR BISCUIT, ROUGHLY CRUSHED
12 MARSHMALLOWS QUARTERED (USE SCISSORS), OR USE MINI
MARSHMALLOWS (ROUGHLY 48)

2 X 55G BARS OF YOUR FAVOURITE CHOCOLATE BAR, CHOPPED (SOMETHING WITH A CRUNCH WORKS WELL: MALTESERS, CRUNCHIE

EIC.)

METHOD

STEP 1

OVER A LOW HEAT, MELT THE BUTTER, CHOCOLATE AND SYRUP IN A PAN STIRRING FREQUENTLY UNTIL SMOOTH, THEN COOL FOR ABOUT 10 MINUTES.

STEP 2

STIR THE BISCUITS AND SWEETS INTO THE PAN UNTIL COMBINED, THEN POUR INTO A 17CM SQUARE TIN LINED WITH FOIL AND SPREAD THE MIXTURE TO ROUGHLY LEVEL IT. CHILL UNTIL SOLID, THEN CUT INTO FINGERS.



Easter in the CARIBBEAN

Over the Easter break Sasha went to St Martin and Anguilla, both are separate islands in the Caribbean. He absolutely loved his trip there! In this article, Sasha shares the history and his love of the islands he visited.

St. Martin Name and ruler

St Martin was the first island I went to; it is split in half. The smaller side is the Dutch side ruled by the Netherlands, while the other side is French, which is the side I went to. The capital of St Martin is Philipsburg which is in the Dutch side of St Martin. The capital of the French side is Marigot. I am using the French name for the Island, which is St Martin, but the Dutch name is Sint Maarten. The Island is named after a French Saint called Martin of Tours who was alive during the 4th century.

History

The first European person to see the island was Christopher Columbus on his expedition of 1493. He immediately claimed for the Spanish although he never landed on the island. A few years later, the French and Dutch saw great interest in the island once it had been mapped because they both had colonies nearby. The island was mostly uninhabited until the Dutch founded a settlement in 1631 making fort Amsterdam. The Dutch East India company started to produce salt in St Martin which, as a result, gave great interest to the French and British. From that time on, many battles ensued with the Dutch and the Spanish to decide who owned the island. The Spanish took the island, but then left after realising that they did not need it. This led to the French and Dutch taking it, causing many battles which changed the border between the French and Dutch 16 times until they agreed in a treaty called the Treaty of Concordia.

ANGUILLA Name and ruler

Apposed to St Martin, which is very mountainous, Anguilla is very flat. Its highest point is 65m which is the same height as the tower bridge in London. As well as being flat, it is quite long; it stretches 16 miles at its longest point from East to West and 3 miles from North to South. The name Anguilla comes from the Italian word Anguilla, meaning eel, in reference to the island's shape. Anguilla is ruled by the United Kingdom and is a British overseas territory.



History

Anguilla was first inhabited around 2000 BCE when the Arawakan speaking Indians (native Americans) came to the island from the Orinoco River in south America and once they had reached the island, they called it Malliouhana. The island stayed under their control for another 3600 years till 1650 when British settlers from St Kitts (another island) came and colonized the island. They built a settlement there and Anguilla became part of the Leeward islands and a British territory. When they arrived on the island no Arawakas were there. From then on it did not go well for the British because there were multiple attacks on the island from Indian (native Americans) as well as French and Irish. The island was recolonized by the British and after many years of tobacco farming, the British decided to start sugar farming to make some money as in Europe, sugar was running low. As a result, the island was a mass sugarcane producer. The island stopped sugar farming and began salt making and to this day still does. Anguilla gained independence in 1975 but is still part of the Commonwealth and will be competing in this year's Commonwealth games.

My opinions on both islands

I had one of my best holidays ever at St Martin and Anguilla. I tried loads of different food, for example Crayfish, Mahi Mahi, Red snapper and Accras as well as learning about diverse cultures. I tried new activities such as paddle boarding and scuba diving where I saw turtles, squids, lots of species of fish and thriving coral reefs.

The weather is very tropical which means temperature were already quite high for April, at around 30 degrees, but it also means that you sometimes get tropical showers. However, they don't last very long. The landscape is splendid, it consists of white sandy beaches, turquoise warm water and palm trees. Pretty idyllic.

I had the most memorable moments and cannot wait to go back. It was such a unique experience. I would definitely recommend it as you can learn so much about their way of living and immerse into a different culture.

rice & peas, to serve

Method

Heat oven to 200C/180C fac/gas 6. With a stick blender or in the small bowl of a food processor, whizz together the jerk seasoning, coconut cream, chilli, apring onions, thyme, garlic and ginger. Stir in the lime zest and juice, and season to taste.

Stash the chicken thighs down to the bone a couple of times, then smear over the jerk paste. Roost in the oven for 45-50 mins until golden brown and cooked through. Sprinkle over more thyme and serve with rice & peas.



Mrs. Foster-Gandey writes the Art events for the show.



"Marmaduke" has inspired me to make more friends because you never know what might happen, and to be more considerate of others.



FOR THE LOVE OF ANIMALS

Newt News

Lucas, in year 9, delves into the life of a newt Throughout a newt's lifecycle, many interesting and unique processes take place to build its illusive abilities. To receive the most accurate account of a newt's growth we interviewed an individual who happened to own one of these amphibians and wrote regularly of its life from egg to adult. He says that from the second he received the creature it began to emerge from its spawn, it took a few minutes and immediately went into its habitat's pond. From what he says he could see; the newt was no larger than 10 cm and only had front legs. Later on in the day, feeding took place so worms and other invertebrates were put amongst it's enclosure. After 3 weeks passed, the newt emerged into his vision, now significantly larger and with back legs; it clambered onto its habitat's banks and would begin sun bathing. Its simple growth had happened and so it would wander in it's home for the rest of its jolly life, occasionally swimming and scavenging for placed food.



If you plan on making an amphibian's enclosure, you will need:

- A filter
 - Dirt
- •Grass/moss/rocks/sticks
- •A supply of invertebrates



When creating a newt's enclosure always make sure to start with the dirt and make sure it is a relatively flat surface. Once done it is highly advisable that you put the filtered water in as the dirt will absorb some of this so you will need to saturate the dirt to the point where it stops doing this so the newt doesn't die of dehydration. After you have laid the dirt, cover it in sparse groups with grass and decor with more sticks and rocks around the water's edge so your newt can live in style.

AND OUT OF THEIR MOUTHS UP TO
150 TIMES PER MINUTE
-THEY FEED ON ANTS, TERMITES AND
OTHER SMALL INSECTS.

GIANT ANTEATERS WALK ON THEIR
KNUCKLES, MUCH LIKE A GORILLA. THIS
IS SO IT CAN KEEP ITS CLAWS SHARP.
THESE CLAWS ARE USED FOR DIGGING
AND FOR DEFENCE. BECAUSE ANTEATERS
HAVE HUGE CLAWS AND VERY STRONG
ARMS, PEOPLE OFTEN ASSUME THAT
THEY ARE RELATED TO BEARS.
ALTHOUGH THEY ARE BUILT JUST AS
STRONG AS A BEAR, THEY ARE FROM THE
SAME FAMILY AS A SLOTH. NOT QUITE
SO MENACING.

THEY USE THEIR POWER FOR
FORMIDABLE DEFENCE. ANTEATERS REAR
UP ON THEIR HIND LEGS AND LASH OUT
WITH THEIR CLAWS. A SINGLE SWIPE IS
POWERFUL ENOUGH TO KILL A JAGUAR
OR A CAIMAN, BOTH OF WHICH ARE
APEX PREDATORS IN THE ANTEATERS'
HABITAT.

THEIR TAIL IS USED AS A COVER TO KEEP THEM WARM AT NIGHT OR COOL IN THE DAY. THE TAIL ACTS AS AN INSULATOR WHEN THEY SLEEP. IT ALSO ACTS AS A FORM OF CAMOUFLAGE TO HIDE FROM THEIR PREDATORS.

GIANT ANTEATERS HAVE THE LOWEST BODY TEMPERATURE OF ALL MAMMALS. THEY REGULATE AT AROUND 91 FAHRENHEIT. AS A RESULT OF THIS, THEY HAVE A MUCH SLOWER METABOLISM. THIS IS HANDY WHEN THEY PRIMARILY EAT A PROTEIN RICH DIET WHICH LACKS CARBOHYDRATES.



THEY CAN BE FOUND NATURALLY IN
FOURTEEN DIFFERENT COUNTRIES. THESE ARE
HONDURAS, NICARAGUA, COSTA RICA,
PANAMA, COLUMBIA, GUYANA, FRENCH
GUIANA, SURINAME, ECUADOR, PERU,

DOGS!






